CMI RETURNS JUNE 18-30

Shenandoah University's Church Music Institute is gearing up for its 2023 sessions. First Week: June 18-23 features guest clinician/recitalist **Nicole Keller** from the University of Michigan. Emphasis will be on the organ with sessions on literature, performance practices, conducting from the console, leading congregational singing, and more.

Week Two: June 25-30 features guest clinician/recitalist **Mark Hayes**, known for his many fine compositions. Emphasis on organ will continue this week but other sessions will be offered on the piano, its use in worship, and repertoire.

Both weeks include optional private coaching with the clinicians, sessions on handbells, and sessions on worship planning and philosophy/theology of worship and music. Evening events include a wide variety of worship services and concerts, and both clinicians will present full recitals. All evening events are open to the public for free.

Attendees may participate on a non-credit basis, but they may also register for credit toward Church Music Certificates at either the undergrad or graduate level. Costs to attend the day sessions are yet to be determined by the university but will be posted closer to registration time in May. WINCHESTER TRUMPETER ON PIPEDREAMS


Exciting News!

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OPEN AUDITIONS: Winchester Musica Viva

Winchester Musica Viva, a premiere chamber choir with 42 years making fine choral music, is holding auditions for all sections. Viva's repertoire encompasses a wide variety of choral styles including classical music, new music, standard choral literature, and original compositions, as well as lighter genres such as jazz and spirituals.

Singer auditions will be held in August 2023, prior to the beginning of rehearsals for the fall season. Viva rehearses on Sunday evenings in downtown Winchester from 6:30-9 PM. The Artistic Director, Dr. Bryce Hayes of James Madison University, is seeking highly skilled musicians to audition for the ensemble. Interested singers are encouraged to audition with a prepared piece, sight-reading, and range work. Music teachers, college staff and graduate students, and those with significant upper-level choral experience are encouraged to reach out.

"THE TOP OF VIRGINIA" - 2013 2013 Convention Coordinator Remembrances from exactly 10 years ago Winchester 2013: Region III AGO Convention

Friends,

It is hard to imagine that 10 years have passed since WAGO hosted the AGO Regional Convention. In 2013, Dr. Eileen Guenther, president of AGO stated, "Winchester was the smallest chapter to host a Regional Convention and she was very proud of the results." At national conventions, in workshops designed to prepare future host chapters, our WAGO chapter has been recognized as a model to follow and noted for the inspiration it offered to other chapters.

Our inspiration to take on such a big project was provided by the dean, at that time, Larry Correll. When Larry suggested the idea of submitting a proposal, 3 years in advance, I thought he was kidding. But as the weeks passed, it became obvious that he was not kidding and with much hard work, by this very special chapter, the convention became a reality.

As you review the convention schedule, enjoy some great memories. Thank you for your hard work and dedication. What started as a vision, ended as a community offering that we can celebrate with pride 10 years later. Some of my memories include the following:

1. First obstacle – 2 years in advance we found out the Vacation Bible School at Grace Lutheran was going to be the week of the convention and we needed to use their sanctuary. After meeting with the church staff, we ended up opening the convention, at Grace Lutheran, with a fabulous "Hymn Festival", led by David and Susan Cherwien. We shared the space with the VBS castle and told the audience it was built in honor of their arrival.

2. Many great programs (along with the Hymn Festival), of which two stand out for me:

- Recital at Trinity Episcopal Church, Upperville, Nathan Laube. It was Nathan'sbirthday, so following the recital we sang "Happy Birthday" as he blew out the candles on his cake.

- A stunning performance of "Phantom of the Opera" (Silent Movie), with organ accompaniment by Paul Fleckenstein, Market St. UMC.

- 3. Educational opportunities (Great opportunities to hear up-and-coming artists)
- Quimby Competition winner's recital at Market St. UMC.

- Outstanding Student Recital (performers chosen from Curtis Institute of Music, Westminster Choir College and Peabody Conservatory of Johns Hopkins), held at Braddock St UMC.

4. Fun with new and old friends.

- The banquet at 1st Presbyterian – featuring an impromptu dinner theater by Mark Schweizer.

This July 7-10, 2023, reflect on our experience of bringing the highest level of organ playing, choral music and great workshops to the Region. Thanks for the memories.
