## From the Dean

#### If the Shoe Fits: Choosing the Best Option for a Scholarship

I want to give you an update on our discernment regarding funding a path towards honoring Dr. Cooksey with any number of excellent options. First, it is not so easy as passing around a hat and requesting donations. We have been very successful with this type of fundraising for the Winchester Rescue Mission and WATTS.

(NOTE: Please remember our fall benefit fundraiser on Sunday afternoon, November 16<sup>th</sup> at 3:00 PM, Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church, Winchester, for these two wonderful community services. We are in the discovery phase. I have to date, talked with Edward Jones Financial Advisor James Imho. James has lengthy credentials with money issues, such as raising funds, and the investment side of building a trust. I have also had a conversation with my attorney, Charles Alton, about the legal needs of a fiduciary responsibility. He recommended a well-known business called Charles Schwab. They are a national investment company, and the opening page will give you some idea of how specific a wealth portfolio can be. Mr Alton suggested that we might be well off to start with a CPA, as they would have knowledge of the parameters of the regulations.

And, the internet has an unending list of information that, like an ivy vine, leads to threads of topics. Both these gentlemen and some of our members say "Do Your Homework first".

I have a pile of papers to hand out. I am directing my research topic as the type of scholarships that are most popular and available. There are competitions, grants, awards, and loans, just to pick a few. One source mentioned that most financial aid is given out based on need or merit. Some are given out regularly (every year or alternating years). Some have developed trusts, and some give out the awards as they have money to support the award.

So, you see that the options are bewildering. I am asking for your help. I would like to develop a survey and an assignment. \* (Note: I will be away from November 7 through  $16^{\text{th.}}$  When I return, look for a communication from me and some suggestions of areas for research.. I would ask that you do some reading. Then we will get together and try to limit our options.

Also of primary importance is what to do in the meantime. One of our board members feels very strongly that we should ask for money right now and then fit the horse to the shoe, so to speak. I think we might consider what kind of timeline is reasonable for us to follow.

I was about to wrap up my finish to this newsletter when I received a call from one of our members who had recently found a young man who would be perfect for attending a PEO. Our member had only a brief acquaintance with the family, but had a discussion with the parent of the young high school student to see if a week at POE camp might be a good thing. Like tinder in the winter, the flame of curiosity was lit. Our member told me that they had already posted the POE sites and one was a fairly short drive between the family home and the POE location. I mentioned that we supported another young for two POE trips. Is this how you would remember Cooksey?

And about feeling overwhelmed, just be reminded of Dr. Cooksey who stopped at nothing to do his best for us.


